Course: *L0197 Integrating Access and Functional Needs into Emergency Planning* Sidney, Montana - September 15-16, 2015

Course Description:

To provide participants who are responsible for providing or participating in Emergency Planning with the information necessary to utilize disability and access and functional needs-inclusive practices, as well as the additional updated skills and knowledge they will need to prepare for, respond to, and recover from emergencies.

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of the course, the participant will be able to:

- Define access and functional needs and disabilities.
- Define key terms related to inclusive planning.
- Identify resources to assist in planning with and for adults and children with disabilities and access and functional needs.
- Identify the essentiality of inclusive practices.
- Learn how to incorporate access and functional needs in all phases of emergency management.

Course Length:

This course is two full days. Class will run from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day.

Notice to Applicants for EMI courses:

Individuals applying for EMI classes will be required to register using the FEMA Student Identification (SID) number. This number will be used in place of the Social Security Number (SSN) on your application form.

How do I obtain my FEMA SID number?

Step 1: To register, go to <https://cdp.dhs.gov/femasid>

Step 2: Click on the “Need a FEMA SID” button on the right side of the screen.

Step 3: Follow the instructions and provide the necessary information to create your account.

Step 4: You will receive an email with your SID number. You should save this number in a secure location.

What do I do with this new SID number I have been assigned?

The SID number is used in place of the SSN on your General Admissions Application (FEMA Form 119-25-1).

To register for the L0197:

Reclamation and Development Grants Program Planning Grants – Call for Applications

The 2015 Legislature authorized the Montana Department of Natural Resources and Conservation (DNRC) \$800,000 in funds for Reclamation and Development Grants (RDG) Program planning grants. Approximately \$200,000 are available this cycle.

APPLICATION DUE DATE: by Midnight on Friday, September 25, 2015

NEW in 2015: The Reclamation and Developments Grant Program is using the State of Montana grant application and tracking database called WebGrants at www.fundingmt.org. The attachments provide instructions on how to register for an account and for how to complete an online grant application. WHO: Tribes, cities, counties, conservation districts, and other local government entities

WHAT: Planning for natural resource projects that provide natural resource benefits in one of two categories:

- mineral development impacts or
- crucial state need.

Mineral development impact projects must:

1. Reclaim land, water or other resources adversely affected by mineral development, or
2. Mitigate damage to public resources caused by mineral development, or
3. Research, demonstrate, or provide technical assistance to promote the wise use of Montana minerals, or
4. Investigate and remediate sites where hazardous wastes or regulated substances threaten public health or the environment, or
5. Research to assess existing or potential environmental damage resulting from mineral development.

Crucial state need projects must prevent or eliminate severe and unacceptable damage to natural resources or capture extraordinary public benefit that would otherwise be lost. Public benefit from implementation of this type project must directly relate to natural resources.

Project activities may include, but are not limited to: (1) problem analysis, (2) feasibility or design studies, (3) environmental monitoring, (4) remedial action plans, (5) technology demonstration, (6) research, (7) construction, or (8) other related actions that lead to a full-scale project.

Funding limit: Up to \$50,000 per planning project, depending on intended planning activities.
